Concept Note

Languages like Bengali, English and Sanskrit enjoy proximity to the Arabic Language in educational institutions in India. The proximity between the Indian sub-continent and the Arab peninsula had been strong enough since the pre-Islamic days. Such linkages could be visualized through seafaring, trade and religio-cultural missions. Now, when we turn our attention to the impact of India on the Arabic culture and language and vice-versa, we note that it acts in two ways—one is social and the other is literary. The former is through trade and the other is through the exchange of cultures. In later periods, Persian culture influenced the Arabs. The Arabs, on the other hand, transmitted this cultural union when they established political control over the Indian subcontinent.

The Arabs considered the Indian people as one of the four nations having distinctive qualities— the others being the Persians, the Romans and the Chinese. They also acknowledged India's rich heritage in Mathematics, Astronomy, Medicine and many other arts. Al – Qifti has even said that the eight peoples who paid attention to Science and excelled in their status were the Indians, the Persians, the Chaldeans, the Greeks, the Romans, the Egyptians, the Arabs and the Jews.

The Arabs acquired knowledge from Indian books on Mathematics, Geometry, Philosophy, Astrology, etc. written in different Indo-Aryan languages like Sanskrit, English and later Bengali. Undoubtedly, we can say that the Arabic Language and Literature have benefitted from the Indian heritage of knowledge as well as the Indo-Aryan languages i.e. Sanskrit, Bengali, English and their literature have also been enriched with the fragrance of Arabic language and literature. Needless to say that the spread of Muslim rule over undivided Bengal for centuries contributed substantially to the development of Arabic learning in the educational institutions of present West Bengal and Bangladesh. Later on, since the British East India Company started to patronize and establish modern institutions of learning, especially when they set up Calcutta Madrasa (Later Aliah Madrasa College & Aliah University), and University of Calcutta respectively, the interrelationship between these languages flourished even more.

Presently, the flourishing phenomenon of such interrelation between these languages and cultures can be seen even in the curriculum of the educational institutions of West Bengal whether it is Govt. and private. But to make the best use of such interrelations and make them flourish more there are certain intrinsic and extrinsic challenges related to both pedagogical as well as non-pedagogical spheres to be overcome.

Thus the main concern and focus of this Seminar will remain to try and understand the correlations between these languages and help find ways in which may address the problems and impediments in the way of such fruitful interrelations in the future. The same is envisaged to be deliberated systematically by a galaxy of national and international honourable experts of learning, language teaching, and cultural studies with an aim to smooth sailing between Arabic and other Languages for educational, academic and professional purposes.
